Now we are into the month of LOVE.


Don't forget February 14th guys.

A BLAST FROM THE PAST

Recently, Hamilton Squadron members paid tribute to Chief Frank D. Smith, the last police chief of the Hamilton Harbour Police. On behalf of the Squadron, a commemorative certificate was presented to Chief Smith for the many years of close affiliation between the Squadron and his department.

February 7th, 1986 was a sad day in Hamilton. On that day, the last harbour police force in Canada was disbanded. Because of the costs involved in running the department, the Harbour Commissioners informed the force that the department would be terminated. Both Sault Ste. Marie and Toronto preceded Hamilton in this

context. Mother Nature provided a super sendoff – northeasterly winds of 50 to 60 knots and blowing snow as a "farewell"! Now, the harbour is under the jurisdiction of the Hamilton-Wentworth Regional Police Department.

Hamilton Squadron has been fortunate to have had close ties with the Harbour Police be it displaying our CPS/ECP Squadron pamphlets, providing guest speakers to our classes and Niagara District Council meetings, and most important of all, referring potential students to our classrooms. We realize the importance of being situated on the waterfront, where many Squadrons are landlocked. I, in

particular, spoke to the Chief on many occasions, and he was always more than willing to offer any support he could when Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons was mentioned.

In the early 1920's, on Burlington Bay, there were a number of drownings which led to public outcries, and the result was a rescue vessel and operator supplied by the Hamilton Habour Commissioners. Details are sketchy, for only newspaper articles list details concerning the harbour. Imagine the stories that could and, perhaps, should have been written during prohibition! During Chief Frank Smith's tenure from 1977 to 1986, he is proud to boast that no child drowned in Hamilton Harbour.

During World War II, the Commissioners – in an effort to protect their property and warehouses on Piers 8 and 10 – started the Shore Patrol.

Once the St. Lawrence Seaway opened in 1959, Hamilton became a famous port, with ships berthing from all around the world. It soon became evident that a Harbour Master was required to handle the traffic and, of course, deal with manners and customs of the crews from various foreign countries.

The Port of Hamilton kept getting busier, and by the time 1964 rolled around, it became evident that changes were needed in the Shore Patrol to control the policing of the movements of the cargoes and warehouse storage on the docks.

Costs, involving both the Marine and Shore Patrols, indicated that one department would cut costs and solve the duplication problem.

The Harbour Police took charge of the communications control station in 1974. In 1979, the Commissioners enacted a Harbour Police By-law, formally establishing the Harbour Police.

Continual upgrading in personnel saw the requirement that all Harbour Police personnel must attend the Ontario Police College in Aylmer, Ontario, from 1976 and onwards. The Commissioners adopted the small vessel licence system in 1979, and it has been in effect until this year.

Under By-Law 84, the harbour master and chief of police co-ordinated all yachting events held on Burlington Bay. The Harbour Police kept reports on events and issued reports to the port director and harbour master to keep the flow of information running smoothly between the various departments. In this way, each department was aware of all boating aspects and could, therefore, make decisions based on the correct facts and day-to-day operations on the bay. The last Harbour Police Chief was Frank Smith, 1977 to 1986.
