

From the Commander

It is March, the month as enigmatic as Mona Lisa's smile. One can never be confidant that March, despite hosting the vernal equinox and providing a week of extraordinarily warm and sunny days will not blindside us with yet another generous helping of winter. Spring is a time of transition from one season to the next. We are glad winter is ending and welcome spring and summer.

So it is with the squadron, we too are winding down the 2005-2006 year in several aspects. Our fiscal year ended March 31, the terms of the officers of the bridge will end at our AGM in May, and most importantly the 2005-06 training year will culminate with the graduation ceremony also held May 12,2006.

I am proud of the efforts made by all of the instructors, proctors, and officers who participated in making this year the success that I hold it to be.

Early on in the year HPS lost two key officers. The squadron training officer and the treasurer both left us at a critical time; the planning stage for our training schedule. A funding program made available from the Ministries of Education and Tourism through local school boards to not for profit organizations allowed us to move our courses to Westdale High School.

Our registrations on three dates at the Marine Discovery Centre produced 35 boating students, 10 for piloting, 15 for Boat Pro, 11 for VHF and 9 for GPS.

These numbers were increased later from other means of registrations.

We expect that by the end of May when the last VHF and GPS courses are completed we will have seen about 75 take the radio course and probably 30 or so will do the GPS.

This year HPS purchased a second lap top computer and a second multi media projector, and with new course materials from CPS and the Guelph Squadron our instructors integrated this new equipment into our instructional efforts.

On May 12/06 our AGM/Graduation ceremonies will end the 2005-06 year, and then at our August

bridge meeting we will be off and running for 2006-07

By that time the summer solstice will have long since passed and we will still have warm sunny days and short nights, but old Sol is heading south and the earth is cooling. The boating season will soon end in this neck of the woods, but HPS will be dusting off the textbooks and stoking the stoves in the classrooms in preparation for the next classes.

HOT STUFF

uring a recent conversation with Rob Young at our Boating Classes, he discussed using a laser guided infrared temperature gun for checking temperatures around his boat. Rob has a forty foot diesel powered tug. Rob is helping out at our boating classes by being a proctor. He uses one of these thermometers to check temperatures of the exhaust stack, shaft bearings, input and output on heat

exchangers and alternators. For example, when he is cruising on a calm sea, the exhaust stack measures around 360 degrees F. When the boat is heading against a strong wind, the stack temperature rises to around 475 degrees F, showing that the engine is working harder (and using more fuel). You just pull the trigger, point at a distant object, release the trigger and read off the temperature in degrees C or F (switch selectable). It is important to log the read-



ings, so that you can compare temperatures to keep ahead of any brewing problems, nipping them in the bud. I have heard that auto mechanics use these thermometers to check the input and output temperatures of catalytic converters, to see if they are functioning properly. You can easily find a dead or misfiring cylinder on a diesel engine by measuring the temperatures at the exhaust manifold. You

can locate loose or corroded connections or hot spots in electrical panels and wiring . If you really want to impress your friends, you could use your laser guided thermometer to check the water temperature to see if it is warm enough for a swim. I got mine at Princess Auto for around 90 dollars. Rob suggests getting one that measures up to 1000 degrees F.

Boaters should heed the UV warnings as announced over local radio stations and during TV weather forecasts. Sunscreen should be part of your kit and used faithfully. The Inuit are experiencing sunburn, and unfortunately also the maladies that attend overexposure to the sun. Overexposure can produce deep crevices and a leathery looking skin texture which may make one appear to be much older.

Lis great to see a decent turnout to our boating classes again. This is due to some hard work and fresh ideas. The recruiting at the Marine Discovery Centre seems to have made a significant change for the better. The teaching of safe boating is the main reason for our existence and it is gratifying to see this renewed interest in CPS courses. We have to thank our teachers and proctors for their time and effort: Rob Garland, P/C Rick Crook, John Nydegger, Rob Young, Commander Cal Traver, Pat Faux, Des Wood, P/C Hank Brunnader, P/C Marney Warby, P/C Ron Warby, P/C Percy Brown, Murray Charlton, Brenda Draper, & John Greene.

I have mixed feelings relying too heavily on Power Point presentations for teaching our courses. We must not be blinded by this relatively new technology. It is both complex and expensive. By nature, lessons have to be prepared in advance, then followed in a fairly rigid fashion. It can be difficult to deal with the vagaries of teaching a lesson, as when there are questions from students. It is not easy to amend Power Point on the fly, to accommodate these, without risking catastrophic errors.

We must not discount the relatively simple overhead projector. For example the Squadron's Elmo overhead projector, has a spare bulb already mounted in a socket ready to go. If the projector bulb blows, it can be replaced on the fly by simply moving a lever, with no cool down required. Try that with a video projector! This Elmo machine is about 20 years old and is still up to the task. Using the low tech overhead projector, the well prepared instructor should have some prepared acetates, along with several blank spare acetates and coloured markers, to easily amend or amplify points. In all fairness though, the CPS prepared Power Point presentation on the Canadian Buoyage system showed very clearly the light characteristics of the navigation aids.

On Monday evening of January 30, the "Cider Night" was hosted at the Westdale Boating Classes. It was a great way for our students to see some of what goes on behind the scenes at our Squadron. People were able put a name to a face of our Bridge members and meet with them. Our thanks go out again to Donna Madden and Bonnie Hazell and others who put out a bountiful table of treats and drinks for everyone to enjoy.

The February 24 "Cruising For Fun Night" at Macassa Bay Yacht Club was a fun evening indeed. COLD SHOCK CAN KILL IN MINUTES: A PFD CAN SAVE YOUR LIFE

person can die in less than three minutes if immersed in very cold water. Even skilled swimmers experience swimming failure quickly with cold shock. People rapidly lose manual dexterity at this temperature.

Exposure to cold water causes sudden-immersion reflex, resulting in a victim gasping for breath and experiencing breathing difficulties. This can lead to hyperventilation, dizziness, and muscle spasms. The shock of the cold water forces one to gasp and swallow water, causing one to choke. Victims also have difficulty holding their breath. There is a significant rise in heart rate and blood pressure. Cold water immersion can cause a heart attack or a

The best way to survive cold shock is by wearing a personal flotation device (PFD) at all times.

Seconds count - a PFD can save your life.

These intense and rapid physiological responses make it difficult for a victim to locate, put on, and fasten a PFD once in the water. Expect the

unexpected - wear your PFD at all times!

A PFD helps victims stay afloat, allowing one to gain control of breathing, thus keeping air passages clear. It also keeps a victim from going under due to loss of muscle control.

Boaters in cold waters should always wear a PFD while on board a vessel. Once you are in the water, it is probably too late.

CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING IS AN INVISIBLE DANGER TO BOATERS

(NC)-Carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning is being blamed for an increasing number of boating deaths. Boaters cannot detect CO, as it is a colourless and odourless gas. CO is produced during the incomplete combustion of fossil fuel and can cut off the oxygen supply to the body. It can cause death in minutes.

CO can be generated by idling your engine, heating your cabin, or cooking in poorly ventilated areas. Be especially careful in areas which have been modified, such as cabin extensions and areas fitted with canvas tops. Use a carbon-monoxide detector that has been designed for use in a vessel and check its batteries before every trip.

A swimmer can be overcome by CO poisoning in a few breaths and drown. Swimmers and divers are at

risk of CO poisoning in areas under platforms mounted on vessels or between the pontoons of houseboats.

There is also a danger when boat engines have been left to idle in poorly ventilated areas. Watch out for the back-draft effect: a tail wind can carry CO back into the vessel.

CO can build up in vessel spaces when two vessels are tied to each other, in vessels where an improper load distribution causes the bow to ride high, and near the exhaust terminus of portable generators when the vessel is stationary and the generator is running.
