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HISTORY OF MONTREAL SQUADRON

The man responsible for bringing forward the idea of the formation of a Montreal Squadron of the Canadian Power Squadrons was the late A.S. "Andy" Foreman skipper of the motor yacht "Petril II". For several years before his death in 1949, when chairman of the Power Yacht Committee of the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club, he had corresponded with the United States Power Squadron and the Canadian Power Squadron in an endeavour to obtain the necessary information for the formation of a Montreal Power Squadron. The results of this correspondence is found on the agenda of a meeting of this committee held on the 18th day of February, 1949 which notes "Formation of a a further meeting on February 24th, item 10, Power Squadron" and at "Consideration of a Power Boat Squadron or revival of the Quebec Yachting Association". After the death of Andy Foreman, A.T. Galt Durnford was elected in his place as chairman of this committee and on the agenda of his first meeting of Power Yacht owners, held in the University Tower Building on the 19th day of January, 1950, item 13 of new business for consideration was "Formation of Power Boat Squadron as a branch of the Canadian Power Squadrons with headquarters in Toronto".

After considerable discussion, among the fifteen members present, regarding Canadian Power Squadrons, about which very little was known, a show of hands indicated that 7 - 8 would be interested in becoming members and forming a Montreal Power Squadron. Victor B. Lillie then volunteered to find out what requirements were necessary to join the C.P.S. and report back to the committee, and if approved, make arrangements for the entering course then known as that of "Junior Piloting".

With considerable assistance from W.E. Thompson of the Toronto Power Squadron, Chief Commander Gordon Calder of the London Squadron, and following the results of a canvass of all the Yacht Clubs in the Montreal vicinity, and thanks to Victor Lillie's enthusiasm and hard work, a course was organized and the first lecture held on Monday evening, November 20th, 1950 in the Lecture Hall of the office R.H. Samson Company, 356 Youville Street. This Hall was used during the day for courses for merchant seamen and officers. Captain H.B. Mole, Master Mariner, then a lecturer of the Samson firm, was engaged to give the course of approximately twelve lectures. A charge of \$15.00 was made for the course, Annual Fees were to be \$3.00 with \$2.00 to go to the C.P.S. and \$1.00 as Entrance Fee.

As a minimum of ten were required to form a new Squadron, and as the passing mark for the examination was 80%, the group was very relieved when 35 individuals agreed to take the course.

Thanks to Captain Mole's particular sense of humour and his ability to bring himself down from the level of ocean going salt-water ships to that of small craft sailing on inland fresh water with the intricacies of Canadian Lake water navigation, the course was an unqualified success. The Squadron was fortunate indeed to have found Captain Mole and there is no doubt but that a large part of the success of the Montreal Power Squadron is due to his teaching. Capt. Mole taught both Piloting and advanced courses each year until his retirement in 1971.

The studying and cramming for the examination that took place as the date of the exam approached was something new for many of the candidates, most of whom had left school some years before!

The examination was held on the 3rd day of March, 1951 and a charge of \$0.50 was made to cover the exams. The paper was broken out at 8.00 P.M. in the Lecture Hall with the last man handing in his paper around 1.00 A.M. Twentyone wrote the examination and only two failed to pass. The drop in membership from the original 35 who started the course is accounted for by the fact some gave up the course while others were improving their health in the Florida district at the time of examination. Vice-Commander James C. Michie, of the Governing Board in Toronto, impressively and properly attired in the uniform of the C.P.S., brought the paper from Toronto and was of great assistance in conducting the examination, owing to the fact that at this time none of those taking the course knew much about the methods and customs of C.P.S.

Towards the end of the course, and shortly before the examination, a group consisting of V.B.Lillie, L.B. Campbell, A. McMaster, A.T.G. Durnford, E.T. Renouf, F.Scott, and others, after suitable refreshment in the Lounge of the Engineers' Club, anticipating a victory at the examinations and approval for the formation of a Montreal Squadron from the Governing Board of the C.P.S., discussed the question of possible officers for the new

Squadron. Consequently, at the last lecture Galt Durnford proposed, seconded by Victor Lillie, the following slate which was voted on and carried -

The results of the examinations were anxiously awaited by the group, especially so as ten successful papers were required for the success of the Squadron.

In April, 1951, the names of the nineteen

Successful candidates were received in alphabetical alphabetical order, as at that time the custom was that no one knew who was first or who was last.

Thus, following the results of the examination, there was an active organized group ready to commence negotiations with the Governing Board of the C.P.S. for a Montreal Squadron.

Victor Lillie assumed the office of Commander and organized as energetically as he had the course of lectures, all arrangements including a constitution, for the acceptance and formation of the Montreal Squadron by the Governing Board. This was officially sanctioned on March 21st, 1951. The first official function of the Squadron was a mixed dinner at the Berkeley Hotel, Montreal, held on Thursday, April 12th 1951 at which copies of the constitution and by-laws written by Victor Lillie were distributed, with much argument, discussion and talk for and against, taking place.

After this affair the committee decided to keep the members informed of progress by issuing Bulletins, No. 1 being dated May 23rd, 1951. This notified the members of the acceptance and approval of the Montreal Power Squadron and the calling of the first Annual Meeting and first Rendezvous of the Squadron Fleet on June 16th, 1951. Bulletins Nos. 2 and 3 covered instructions for the first Rendezvous, when boats of the Squadron met at the Red Flashing Buoy off Pointe Claire. Thirteen boats gathered and set off in formation of line Astern,

returning to the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club for lunch. The members in charge of this rendezvous were W.J.M. Greene, L.B. Campbell and A.T.G. Durnford.

At the luncheon attended by 55 members, guests and friends, including Captain and Mrs. Mole, the course instructor, the Charter Members were presented with their certificates by the Squadron's good friend from Toronto, Vice Commander Michie. These first certificates were signed by Chief-Commander Gordon N. Calder and Victor B. Lillie as Commander of the new Squadron.

The framed Original Charter is passed from Commander to Commander each year.

With the conclusion of this rendezvous and meeting, the Montreal Power Squadron was at last well established and fully constituted, consisting of a group of enthusiastic yachtsmen, largely brought about by the energy and interest of Victor Lillie.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FIRST YEAR

Highlights of the first year of operation were, the formation of an operations committee under William Harrison who, with his committee, proposed a draft resolution proposing that government action be taken to amend the law with regards to the road tax on gasoline insofar as power propelled boats of all classes were concerned. It was then agreed that this resolution be presented to the Premier of the Province of Quebec. This presentation was submitted and acknowledged by Hon. Maurice Duplessis, but nothing further was heard on the subject, in spite of the efforts of the committee and subsequent Commanders. The matter was shelved in 1955. In the training department 22 attended Junior Piloting under Capt. Farrell at the Westmount High School and sixteen took Advanced Piloting with Capt. Mole doing the instructing in premises made available by The Royal Bank of Canada. At the Annual Meeting of Canadian Power Squadrons held at Simcoe, Ontario in November 1951, V. B. Lillie was appointed Rear Commander by the Governing Board, and held that office, as well as that of Commander of Montreal Power Squadron. The second Annual Meeting of the Montreal Power Squadron was held on May 21st, 1952 at the United Services Club, and twenty nine members were present. At this second Annual Meeting it was moved by Commander Lillie, and seconded by I. McDougall, that a resolution be forwarded to the Governing Board, that all ladies who have passed their Junior Piloting course be admitted to Associate Membership in the Squadron. Lt. Commander Renouf was instructed to take this up with the Governing Board, and, in April 1953 this resolution was adopted. At this meeting J. R. R Gough proposed a suggested code of flag etiquette, and it was agreed that this would be passed to the Governing Board for adoption by Canadian Power Squadrons.

Highlights of the year

A cruise to Lighthouse Inn at Pointe Aux Anglais on June 7, 1952 and it was noted that the pleasant weather was offset by an extremely awkward southwest wind, which made docking at the wharf slightly hazardous. However no mishaps were recorded.

The second cruise was on July 4 - 6 with Carillon as the destination.

The Publicity Committee reported that the 'Port Hole', previously the House Organ of the Toronto Squadron, was to become the House Organ for Canadian Power Squadron as a whole, and would carry such news and information as was sent by the Montreal Squadron. In September 1952 Commander Renouf participated with others of the Montreal Squadron competing in the navigation contest for the Claydee Cup held in Toronto.

Later in the year, Commander Renouf donated the trophy bearing his name, the terms of reference of which would be similar to those of the Claydee Trophy, the purpose of the competition being proficiency in navigation.

The third Annual Meeting was held on May 25th, 1953 at the Montreal Club. Thirty-three members attended along with the following guests, Chief Commander C. R. Lunt <u>A.P.</u> and Rear Commander F. J. Milne J.N. of Canadian Power Squadrons, Captain Mole, Mr. Stirling of the Gazette and Messrs. Gauthier and Beaudet of Three Rivers. These two gentlemen were introduced as being the nucleus of a new Squadron to be formed in the city of Three Rivers. As it turned out they were not successful in obtaining enough interest, and it was not until 1964 that a Squadron was formed in that city. In the training, fifteen men and three ladies passed Piloting, and nineteen men and three ladies passed Seamanship, bringing the Squadron membership to fifty-four members and seven Lady Associates. A photo competition was held in May 1953 and a trophy donated by L. B. Campbell <u>A.P.</u> was won by A. T. G. Durnford, S.

1953 - 1954

Three cruises were held that year. The first on July 4th, was a well attended cruise to St. Andrews East, where members were guests of the St. Andrews Golf and Country Club. The second cruise took place three weeks later, when 5 boats met in the bay off Dowker's Island, where a practice run for the Renouf Trophy was held. Later the group proceeded to Beauharnois, where anchors were dropped on the South side of Ile aux Large.

Over Labour Day weekend, all skippers of the Montreal Power Squadron took part in the Renouf Trophy competition off Dowker's Island, and then proceeded to Carillon, where they tied up at the guard lock of the canal. S. B. McRobert and family were declared winners of the Renouf Trophy. S.B. McRobert and crew of Commander W. Harrison <u>A.P.</u>, Lieut. J. B. Hall <u>A.P.</u>, and Dr. E. P. Aikman J.N. also won the Claydee Trophy in September 1953.

A Squadron tie design was prepared by A. T. G. Durnford and submitted to Canadian Power Squadrons for approval.

Following discussion at the Canadian Power Squadrons Governing Board meeting, Lieut. Commander Gough and W. Greene were appointed a committee of two, to approach the Department of Transport, Ottawa, to endeavour to obtain a special radio channel for use primarily by pleasure craft. These efforts were later abandoned as changes in regulations eliminated the necessity of a special channel.

Rear Commander Durnford reported on the proposal that the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Quebec, Hon. Gaspard Fauteau be approached to serve as patron of Canadian Power Squadrons was under consideration by the Executive of the Montreal Power Squadron.

The fourth Annual Meeting was held at the Ritz Carlton Hotel on April 27th, 1954. One hundred and two members and guests attended, and the Commander noted that membership was fifty four members and seven Lady Associates.

Head table guests at the Annual Meeting included Chief Commander Lunt of Canadian Power Squadrons and Commander Mongenais of H.M.C.S. Donnacona.

<u> 1954 - 1955</u>

Three cruises were held under the guidance of the Cruise Officer. The first was to St. Andrews on June 12th and 13th, the second to Valleyfield on July 17th and 18th, and the third to Burnt Island West, Gananoque on August 4th. The highlight of this latter cruise was an inspection of all boats present by the R.C.M.P. Of course, all boats passed with flying colours!

Later in the season, on September 11th, 1954 Lt. Stan McRobert arranged for several boats to take crippled children for a run on Lake St. Louis. This was very successful and was carried on for several years.

During the 1954/5 training period, 31 passed Junior Piloting, fourteen passed Seamanship, while five passed Junior Navigator.

The fifth Annual Meeting was held on May 4th, 1955 at the Ritz Carlton Hotel, where ninety-six members and guests attended. Chief Commander W. E. Thompson of Canadian Power Squadrons attended as a guest.

<u> 1955 - 1956</u>

Two cruises were held, the first on July 1st, to Sorel and the second was the Labour Day cruise to Carillon. During this cruise two trophy competitions were held on the Lake of Two Mountains. Stan McRobert and the 'Captor' crew won the Renouf Trophy, while Lucille Dansereau and her crew on the 'Flambeau' were successful in winning the Lillie Trophy. The 'Captor' and crew of Stan McRobert. Jim Hall, Horace Watson, and Percy Aikman competed for the Claydee Trophy at Belleville in August 1955, and did very well, coming second.

In addition to the regular training courses held that year, four passed Navigation, the first in Montreal to do so.

The sixth Annual Meeting took place on March 14th, 1956 at the Arts Club and the graduation ceremonies and dinner took place on May 30th, 1956 at the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club.

One hundred and forty six guests attended, and special guests included Vice Commander M. Proctor of Canadian Power Squadrons, Vice Commander E. T. Renouf of C.P.S. as well as past Commander of Montreal Squadron.

The formation of the new Lake St. Louis Squadron was one of the highlights of the year. Fourteen members of the Montreal Squadron obtained a charter for the new Squadron on May 30th, 1956. Those members were:

About Lake St. Louis Squadron.

The birth of the squadron was initiated by 13 members of the Montreal Power Squadron, who decided that since most of their pleasure boating was on Lake St. Louis, no better reason could be found for breaking away from the Montreal Power Squadron and forming a local squadron. The name selected for this new Squadron was Lake St. Louis Power Squadron.

The Montreal Power Squadron was very cooperative in this regard and was of great help with their support during our early years.

The group of 13 members was led by Henry Vineberg who became Lake St. Louis first Commander and nursed these members along in the formative years.

The Lake St. Louis Power Squadron charter was presented on May 30, 1956 at the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club and it then became the 18th CPS squadron.

The first Lake St. Louis Power Squadron class (boating class) was held at the Lord Reading Yacht Club in October 1956. Lectures were given by the charter members. The original class consisted of fourteen enthusiastic students.

As the classes and interest grew in size, the Squadron moved its classes to the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club in 1961.

In training, twenty three wrote Junior Piloting, eleven wrote Seamanship, and seventeen took the Weather course given by Horace Watson.

The seventh Annual Meeting was held on March 25th, 1957 in the Ward Room of H.M.C.S. Donnacona. The graduation ceremonies were held on May 30th, 1957 at the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club. Among the special guests was Chief Commander E. T. Renouf of the Canadian Power Squadrons, who was Commander of the Montreal Squadron in 1952.

Commander L. B. Campbell, following his retirement as Commander of the Squadron, has continued to be a very strong supporter of all Squadron activities, and in 1970 was Registrar of the C.P.S. Annual Conference held in Montreal. Up to the time of writing this section of the history he continues to act as Squadron Auditor.

It was sadly noted that H. G. I. Watson drowned in a boating accident on August 17, 1958 and at the December 11th, 1958 meeting of the Squadron, it was unanimously approved that a trophy for 'SAFETY' be established in his name.

While a docking competition was held in June, the annual Labour Day Cruise was cancelled in honour of Dr. Watson.

The ninth Annual Meeting was held on May 26th, 1959 at the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club. Vice Commander F. J. Milne officiated at the swearing in ceremony of new members.

Commander S. A. Stephens Jr., following his retirement as Squadron Commander, has continued to be extremely active in Squadron affairs. After serving as Squadron Commander he carried on with District work, and became Commander of the Rideau District in 1960. He was advanced to the National level where he was a Rear Commander for several years. In recent years he has returned to the Squadron level teaching Advanced Piloting, and at the time of writing this history, he had 17 Merit Marks, a Squadron record. (He subsequently earned his Life Membership).

In Training, fifty five were successful in Junior Piloting, sixteen were successful in Advanced Piloting, and a course was also given in Junior Navigator.

In April 1959, the Montreal Squadron, together with the Lake St. Louis Squadron, sponsored a booth at the Allied Boat Show held in the Queen Elizabeth Hotel.

The Annual Labour Day cruise, which was a joint venture of the Montreal and Lake St. Louis Squadrons, went to Carillon this year, with a starting rendezvous at the Ste. Anne's Lock. There was a Competition for the Renouf, Lillie, and Captor trophies en route.

The passage of the Royal Yacht Britannia through Lake St. Louis on June 26th 1959 was the special event of the year, and all available boats of the Squadrons in the Montreal area were on hand for the sailpast.

The Annual Meeting was held on April 27th, 1960 at the home of A. T. G. Durnford, and the graduation ceremonies and dinner were held on June 1st, 1960 at the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club. Among the special guests, were Vice Commander Fred Milne of Canadian Power Squadrons and Past Chief Commander E. T. Renouf.

Two cruises were held this year, on August 19th and 20th, and the Annual Labour Weekend cruise.

The first was to St. Andrews to participate in the formation of the new St. Andrews Power Squadron, which officially took place on August 20th, 1960. Past Squadron Commander and District Officer S. A. Stephens Jr. led a flotilla of eight boats to the rendezvous, and, together with District Commander Rees, conducted the ceremony.

The Labour Weekend cruise was to Coteau Landing, and twenty- two boats participated. During the weekend, a safety competition was held for the Horace Watson Memorial Trophy, and Brodie Sterling and crew went away with the honours.

Training was very successful this year, with seven writing Junior Piloting, fifteen writing Seamanship, thirteen writing Junior Navigator, and twenty-eight enrolled in Engine Maintenance.

Again the Squadron elected to go to Coteau Landing, as this location had proven so successful in the past. However, to introduce some variety into our program, the Cruise Officer, C. D. Cruise Officer Don Buckingham organized some fine cruises this year. Both boating courses were at the maximum classroom capacity, which made us feel rather good as we heard that other Squadrons had poor turnouts altogether.

However we prevailed upon our good friend Peter Yeomans, the mayor of Dorval, and managed to find us accommodations across the road at the Dorval Community Center for our Bridge meetings. They turned out to be much more comfortable than our usual spot.

It is with regret that we have to report the passing of E. Stuart "Jake" Parker, one of our former instructors.




