


CAPTAIN'S TABLE.....



Hello fellow members, I hope you all had a great summer on the water!

As I've just returned from the National conference and AGM in Ottawa, I'll start by sharing some of what I've learned there. We've been

updated by the National Finance Officer on the risks to CPS as a whole in respect to Squadrons and Districts holding too much funds in their bank accounts relative to their operating costs. This ratio is evaluated across the country by the Canada Revenue Agency, and if we



don't correct the situation across the entire organization then we risk losing our charitable organization status. While PMPSS is well within the guidelines established by CRA and the National Finance Officer, we will nonetheless ensure we review and monitor our position as good CPS citizens.

There was quite an active discussion around Environment issues, with Goderich Squadron presenting a movie their Environment Officer (who is also a documentary film maker) had made. It is quite staggering to realize that **Eight MILLION** tons of plastic are entering our waterways annually, from sources even as simple as toothpaste and cosmetic products.

One of the more controversial issues being introduced is an exercise in rebranding of CPS. In the United States Power Squadron over the last year, they have been executing a new branding strategy where they have rebranded themselves as "America's Boating Club". I think we can all relate to the fact that our name, our origins stemming from military traditions, the formality of uniforms and process are all a bit intimidating to people who don't know us. Those that do recognize that we're not even remotely formal except for specific ceremonies, and that we are focused on making sure everyone can go out and have fun on the water safely and be able to return to port at the end of a trip with good friends and good memories. CPS Squadrons across the country recognize this, and the challenge that National is facing is determining how and when we should launch such a rebranding campaign. Commanders offered significant support for rebranding.

Having said that, while we need to forge a new way forward, we are not forgetting our past. We had quite a presentation and discussion of the 80 years of history since CPS began in Windsor, Ontario in 1938. But I will say that what really brought some of this home for me was seeing Past Chief Commander Doreen Hinksman of North Halton Squadron step forward

to receive her FIFTIETH merit mark! 3 others also received their 50th Merit Mark, and one member celebrated her 100th birth-day with the CPS Officers. It should be noted that our neighbours, Burnaby Squadron, were also commended for reaching their 60th anniversary.

We also had the pleasure of meeting Major Doug Ferguson, Deputy Commanding Officer of the 3rd Canadian Ranger Patrol Group of the Canadian Armed Forces. Doug told us about a tremendous initiative his group is carrying on in Northern Canadian

Communities. These communities have approximately 13 times the national average of drowning deaths, primarily because they have limited access to life jackets. Life jackets are very expensive there (>\$100 each), and there are limited SAR resources. Today there are three life jackets per 100 people in a community. Rangers have started a program for training and using life preservers in northern communities, which also includes cold water survival skills, creation of float plans, and a PCOC program tailored for northern climates. "Operation Life Preserver" includes providing life jackets to communities and supporting a swap program. The strategy is to focus on youth, and expose adults through success in the community's children, and have so far distributed over 1500 life jackets. In order to make this program more sustainable, Rangers are seeking industry partners. Salus Marine stepped up and provided a donation of life jackets, and Chief Commander Chuck Beall committed CPS to supporting this initiative. Initiatives will be defined, and logistics sorted out, but at least one tactic discussed was walking the docks (perhaps as a part of Recreation Vehicle Courtesy Checks) and find people who have extra life jackets who wish to donate. I know many will want to help contribute to this, and as we learn more we'll pass this on to you!

While a scheduled date has not yet been announced, staff at the National office have indicated they are seeking to try to switch from the old IT system to the new IT system in November. While I think we all recognize it will take a while for the new system to mature, get bugs ironed out, and have everyone happy with the new system, basic functionality is in place. As soon as we know what the plan is from National for managing people's transition to the new system, we'll be communicating that information with you. In preparation for the move from the existing IT system though, it is important that everyone log in to the current system and ensure their membership information is up to date; National have emphasized to all Commanders that inaccuracies will cause problems for both you and National when we switch to the new IT system. In September I participated in Red Cross First Aid Training along with AED Training, arranged by our Education Officer Michelle Warrington. Several members participated in this training, which is valuable in our daily lives and is great on cruises when we have members who have this training. Thanks to Education Officer Michelle, and her husband Cruisemaster Chris for bringing this idea to life. I know Michelle is looking at offering this again, and I will personally recommend people take this training when the opportunity arises again. Speaking of courses, all of our fall courses are under way, but don't miss the Winter/Spring course offerings we've just announced in this Quarterdeck!

# **Safety Alert**

The United States Coast Guard issued a Marine Safety Alert regarding LED navigation lights and VHF and AlS reception (August 15th, 2018). After receiving multiple reports from various mariners including crews, ship owners, and inspectors of poor VHF and AlS reception when antennas were situated near LED lights, the USCG issued this alert.

The USCG is concerned about how this radio interference could affect maritime safety having determined that LED lamps create radio frequency interference and have caused recorded incidences of degraded VHF and AIS communication.

This is not to say you should stop using LED lighting, as LED lights have been shown to have great power saving benefits aboard vessels. Reception interference can also be difficult to assess. The USCG had recommended the following test to see if you can notice interference with your VHF radio. As interference is created by LED proximity to antennas, the most common culprits are navigation lights and spot lights, however, interior lights and deck flood lights can also cause issues. Mariners should test all onboard LED lighting via the following method:

- 1. Turn off LED lights
- 2. Tune VHF radio to a quiet channel (USCG gives Ch 13 as an example, though this may not be the best channel in all waterways)
- 3. Adjust the VHF radio's squelch control until the radio outputs audio noise.
- 4. Re-adjust the VHF radio's squelch control until the audio noise is quiet, only slightly above the noise threshold.
- 5. Turn on the LED light(s), do this for each circuit/type of lights (spotlight, navigation lights, deck lights, interior lights (by area of the boat).

A) If the radio now outputs audio noise, then the LEDs have raised the noise floor. (Noise floor is generally the amount of interfering signals / static received beyond the specific signal or channel being monitored.)

B) If the radio does not output audio noise, then LEDs have not raised the noise floor.



Make sure to test all lights in a systematic way so that you can isolate any potential problem areas. You may run into interference from multiple LED circuits (such as navigation lights and a search light or deck lights). You are most likely to have issues with LEDs that are in close proximity to your antenna or antenna wires, however, Test all your LED circuits for best piece of mind. We have been out on the boat now for a couple of months, travelling through The Gulf Islands, San Juan Islands and now Desolation Sound. As September approaches there is a marked decrease in boats anchored throughout Desolation This day, August 27<sup>th</sup>, is hot, so we decide to take a dinghy cruise to see who is still left in the various bays around Prideaux. We decide to go round the outside and into Laura Cove first, and as we enter I see something floating, so as we reverse I lean over the side and pluck a wallet from the water!



Opening a wallet that does not belong to you feels very uncomfortable, it feels like you are invading someone's privacy, but we needed to find out if there was at least a means of contacting the owner. The wallet contained not only this person's identity, his whole life, but. as luck would have it, it also contained a current Fishing License.

As you read this you are probably wondering why was it lucky to find a current Fishing License, or maybe you are already ahead of me...... A Credit Card, Debit Card, Health Care Card, Drivers License, BCAA Card..... all the usual contents of a

most dry after being on the dash in the hot sun.

you are reading this, chances are you have a boat, and if you don't have a business card you might want to consider making a Boat Card, that's what we have been doing for several years now.



### The Captain's Table



Simple and left overs warm up easily the next morning!

Easy
Breakfast
Casserole

#### **Ingredients:**

12 large Eggs, Beaten

1/2 Cup Half and Half

1/2 teaspoon Salt

1/4 teaspoon Pepper

2 cups Shredded cheddar cheese

I tablespoon Avocado oil

3 cloves Garlic, minced

8 ounces Mushrooms, sliced

5 ounces Raw baby spinach

4 Slices Thick cut bacon, cooked and cut into

2 inch pieces

(Add items to suit your taste—We've added cooked asparagus too!)

#### **Preparation:**

Pre-heat the oven to 375F and spray a 9 x 9 casserole with cooking spray

In a large mixing bowl, add the eggs, half and half, salt, and pepper. Whisk thoroughly. Add in the cheese

In a large skillet over medium heat, add oil and garlic. Sauté for 1 minute. Add in the mushrooms and sauté for 1 minute more. Finally, add in the spinach and mix in with the mushrooms. Continue to sauté until the spinach is wilted. Remove from the heat.

Add the spinach and mushrooms to the bowl with the eggs. Mix to combine. Pour into the greased casserole and lay the bacon pieces on top.

Bake in the pre-heated oven for 30 minutes or until the casserole is set in the middle.

Opportunities abound for volunteers in the Port Moody Power and Sail Squadron. We serve a large number of people, and are always looking for help, and even when we have enough people, we are looking to the future and considering how to provide capabilities in the future that need training to-day. Here are just a few of the key roles and skills we are hoping to find among our members;

Instructors and Proctors: We have an excellent team of Instructors and Proctors, but are always looking forward to being able to increase what we can offer people from a training perspective. We're also working on a series of evening or weekend seminars open to the public. Proctoring is an excellent opportunity to get exposed to the educational arm of our Squadron, for many it is very rewarding being able to help students and in fact learn much more about the subject at hand as Proctors than they may have as students. If you'd like to help out with the training side of things, we want to speak to you!

Graphic Artist: We have a significant need for volunteers with graphic arts capabilities who can work with both raster and vector image tools. Our needs include creation and editing of graphics content for our newsletter and web presence, content employed for marketing and events, and content employed by the squadron for its business functions. Being able to work comfortably in Photoshop and Illustrator or reasonable equivalents would be desirable for this role.

Web Related: Seeking volunteers interested in helping manage our technical infrastructure, build web site functions, administer our servers and email, and help design and develop our website. We are in an interesting period of change, being driven by the CPS National changes to their systems on which much of our content resides, and anticipate either new development on that platform or moving forward with our own plans for managing web content. If you have technical skills, talk to us!

Quarterdeck: We're always looking for people to contribute articles and content that benefit Squadron members, and publish this today in both the Quarterdeck newsletter as well as our private and public Facebook presence. Shortly we expect to be expanding this to our new content management system, so that our web site also contributes to distributing this content. We're also looking for people to assist with putting together the Quarterdeck newsletter, learn the tools used to build this publication, and help us improve our newsletter moving forward.

Volunteer Officer: Just as we have a Membership Officer who focuses on recruiting new members, ensuring existing members are satisfied and their needs are being met, and being a voice for members to the Bridge, PMPSS wants to have the same focus for volunteers. This is a role aimed at members who have already served on our bridge at some point so that they have experience with how Squadron operations take place, but this is also a new role, and will develop throughout this bridge year, the most important thing you can bring to the table is your values, focus on volunteer role satisfaction, and a passion for serving our membership. You will be working closely with the Commander and Executive Officer developing this new role.

Socials Assistants: This year we are taking on more social activities, and working to include more social elements into other Squadron events like our Recreational Vehicle Courtesy Checks and our annual Shoreline Cleanup. Frankly, our Socials people are GREAT, but more hands make light work, so if you enjoy planning social activities, let us know!

RVCC Inspectors: Our 2018 Cinco de Mayo event had the largest turnout we've ever had for our Recreational Vehicle Courtesy Checks, which of course was great! What wasn't so great was that we didn't have enough qualified inspectors to meet demand, and we were not able to get to everyone who wanted an inspection. Learning to be an RVCC inspector is not difficult, is very rewarding in terms of knowing you are helping keep people safe on the water, and provides a unique learning opportunity to see other vessels and how other vessel owners are doing things and solving problems. We provide both online training and mentorship with existing Inspectors, so if you have an interest, lets discuss it further!
