

Paper Charts -A Thing of The Past?

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). the source for official US government nautical charts, announced it would no longer distribute lithographic nautical charts as of April 2014. Is this the beginning of the end of paper charts as we know them? Will printed charts from the Canadian Hydrographic Service (CHS) be next?

For now CHS still makes paper charts available. That said, they are currently undertaking a study of the future of paper charts and will be seeking input from all of the boating community.

It is often asked, "Am I required to carry nautical paper charts by law as a recreational boater?" The short answer is no. In the Charts and Nautical Publications Regulations, 1995 there are two circumstances in which it is not necessary to carry paper charts, in brief:

- 1) If the vessel is equipped with an Electronic Chart Display and Information System (ECDIS), and backup computers and power supply;
- 2) If the master and owner of a boat less than 100 tons has adequate local knowledge.




Chartplotters, computers with marine navigation software and electronic charts, even low-cost tablets and iPads with \$60 software, which includes data licensed from CHS, all could fulfill the requirement for adequate local knowledge of the surrounding waters.

The key for the prudent navigator is to learn to view electronic charts at the appropriate scale. When they are zoomed out to see the big picture,

important hazard details such as rocks and reefs may not appear.

Are you keeping up with the changing times? The CPS-ECP Electronic Navigation course covers the latest information about connecting your GPS to a laptop, desktop, PDA or tablet computer, and the use of navigational programs for computers. Included with the course is a CD with an electronic charting program and over 200 electronic charts. Practicing with the simulator gives you an excellent





Fish Taco Meal

You had to know it was coming: a fish taco recipe! Beer battering the fish, then dipping it in the Japanese style Panko breadcrumbs creates an ultra crispy coating. The batter is light; almost tempura-like. The beer adds flavor, and the carbonation helps to make the coating nice and crisp.

To keep these tacos dairy free, feel free to use a sour cream substitute for the sauce, and if you like a creamier sauce, you can mix half mayonnaise, half sour cream— it's good that way, too.

You're going to love these tacos, they're like a fiesta in your mouth. Plus they're so easy to make and alter to suit your taste. Add some French fries, or nacho chips, and an ice cold mug of beer and it's a complete meal. Enjoy

Notes: If you're avoiding alcohol, you can make the batter alcohol free by substituting soda water for beer. This breading method allows you to skip using egg in the coating, so those who are allergic to egg can also enjoy this dish.

Preparation-Makes 15

Pour the panko breadcrumbs into a bowl. Have an empty plate handy for the breaded fish. Dip each piece of fish into the batter. When you pull the fish out of the batter, let the excess batter run back into the bowl so fish is lightly coated. Gently place each piece in panko crumbs and flip to

coat. Place the breaded fish onto the empty plate.

Heat 1/4 inch of cooking oil in a skillet over medium high. Fry the breaded fish pieces in batches of 6. Flip the fish when they turn dark golden brown. It will take 2-3 minutes per side for the fish to become golden and crisp. Place the fried fish pieces over

layers of paper towels on a wire rack, if available, to drain.

Now you are ready to assemble your tacos. Heat the corn tortillas in a skillet till they become warm, fragrant, and flexible. Place 2 pieces of fried fish in each taco, add generous spoonful of toppings and 1 tbsp of sour cream sauce. Serve warm with fresh lime wedges.

Taco Ingredients

- 1 1/2 lb. boneless skinless white fish fillets like cod or halibut, cut into approximately 1" x 2" pieces.
- 15 corn tortillas
- Grapeseed oil or oil with a high smoke point for frying.

Toppings

- 2 1/2 cups shredded cabbage
- 2 ripe avocados, thinly sliced
- 2 tomatoes,

- seeded and diced
- Fresh lime juice
- 1 tbsp olive oil

Mix together. You can add other taco toppings if you prefer-- tomato salsa, fresh chopped cilantro, jalapeno or hot sauce for a kick.

Beer Batter

- 1 1/2 cups beer (or substitute seltzer water)
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tbsp cornstarch
- 1 tsp salt
- 3/4 tsp garlic powder

• 1 1/4 cups panko breadcrumbs

Instructions

In a medium mixing bowl, whisk all the ingredients together. Note that the beer will be difficult to measure out due to foam; you'll need at least 1 1/2 cups of beer to make this batter. The batter should be thick like pancake batter, but if it appears clumpy or overly thick add more beer, seltzer or water until mixture is thin enough for dipping.



She passed away unexpectedly at her home in Foam Lake, Saskatchewan, where she was found at her desk on the morning of Wednesday, October 28th by a friend.

Joan grew up in Foam Lake, Saskatchawan lived in easter

Saskatchewan, lived in eastern Canada for most of 35 years, and moved back to Foam Lake in 1992. She is the author of Red Right Returning (Shoreline, 1998) and co-author of

Returning (Shoreline, 1998) and co-author of Bent but not Broken, (Shoreline, 1992). She has been included in the anthology Barbed Lyres and in Morningside Papers. She wrote and voiced a CBC column, Prairie Snapshots for three years and has many periodical credits. She is national president of Canadian Authors Association, a member of Saskatchewan Writers Guild and a member of Storytellers of Canada.

She was 40 when she met Jack Cadman, her second Power & Sail Squadron's Porthole magazine but didn't husband, and Jack owned a wonderful old wooden sailboat called the Hirondelle. They were members of the trips back east for her every year. Source: her online bid

She also wrote in and edited the Canadian Power & Sail Squadron's Porthole magazine but didn't consider it really free because they financed two or more trips back east for her every year.
