




## **Annual General Meeting**

# Time for a Change?



Here is the solution; most gas engines on boats are automotive transplants. It's the same block as in your standard car. A 260 Mercruser is a 350 Chevy; a Crusader is a Ford and so on. If you go to you local automotive parts store like Lordco, T&T and so on; and order a remote filter kit for your engine. Remote mount your filter to a spot where you can change it without having to add a couple more elbows into your arm. And in the case of the Ford Leaman get new hoses and mount the unit upside right in a place you can service it. Now the cool part, you no longer have to rely on the manufactures expensive filters. Most remote setups use a Ford PH8 filter, cheap! So cheap that now you can afford two. You now have the option of installing a double filter setup. This is a remote mount with two filters. When it comes time to connect the filter setup to the engine don't go cheap on the hoses. Use a 3/4" hose and spend the money on a steel braid hose. This will prevent blowout from chafing and will not rupture during an engine fire - spraying hot oil everywhere. Remember the BC ferry fire last summer? An oil line was the cause!

If you can't find the remote set up for your engine at the auto parts store, go to the marine supplier and get the part that goes on the engine only, and get the rest of it at the auto parts store. Still cheap. This system will add additional oil cooling along with the convenience of being able to add oil pressure and temperature gauges easily because most after market filter units come with extra in and out ports.

Keep your oil clean and your bilge too! A nice solution to a slippery problem.

### THE WEATHER WATCH — June 2005

It is not really appreciated that June is usually one of the more dismal, wet, windy and cool months of the year in our neck of the woods. It seems strange that April and May can be so good at times, only to find that June seems like the middle of winter again. This June has been no exception, and for boaters desperately looking for a Spring outing, has been a little frustrating.

The reason for this state of affairs is often due to the establishment of a "Cold Low" over the southern Gulf of Alaska, offshore of the Queen Charlotte Islands. The culprit is cold water, which cools the air mass above it, makes it denser and results in a dip in the upper pressure level contours. The 500 mb level (approx. 18,000') which is the middle of the atmosphere dips down and in effect creates a Low or a deep depression – the influence of which can be seen up into the 250 mb level as well. The jet stream is affected and essentially pumps cool, moist, and often unstable Maritime Arctic air into our part of the world. Cold Low's are long-lasting – they can stay rooted in place for weeks, dependent as they are on water temperature. For boaters -- and apart from the rain and cool temperatures – the most important watchword is to be very careful about forecasts. The nature of the Low is that it irregularly pumps pulses of moist and unstable air which may or may not be a formal "front" on the weather map, or may just be a slight pressure trough which serves to create a local line of convergence instability (remember the thunderstorms this month!). These pulses are very difficult to forecast and their characteristics can change during transit. Good idea is to check the 500 mb chart as well as the surface chart before you make a decision to head across the Strait in marginal weather. If in doubt, call a forecaster on the hot line!

See you on the water after the first week of July, when Cold Low's are usually gone for a while and are replaced by High's moving in from the southwest which deflect the jet stream further to the north.

### **ADVANCED & ELECTIVE COURSES**

Hi all ! Just a little information on Port Moody's Advanced and Elective courses. The Advanced and Elective courses will start in September and October 2005.


<u>The Advanced courses</u> are Piloting, Advanced Piloting and Celestial Navigation. These courses are for CPS members only and must be taken is sequence as each builds upon the previous one.

The Elective courses are Fundamentals of Weather, Global Weather, Marine Electronics, Navigating with GPS, Depth Sounders, Marine Maintenance, Seamanship Sail, Seaman Ship Power, Instructional Techniques, and Offshore Sailing. Check out our web page for further course information <a href="www.portmoodypss.com">www.portmoodypss.com</a>. The Elective courses can be taken by anyone, member or not. They can be taken in any order as they are not connected, they stand alone. They run from several weeks to a one- time seminar in length. The costs are minimal. Five years ago we decided to present more of these courses and the results have been gratifying. We run three in the spring and three more in the fall. We normally need at least six people to run a course, however, if we do not have six people you now have a choice. You can register on a database and then wait until we get six people or you can simply get the course material, study on your own and meet with a proctor once a week to go over homework and get questions answered. All the people from different courses would go to the same place on the same night to go over stuff. This last method is new and this year is the first time that this has been offered. At this point it looks as if we have enough people to run Piloting, Seamanship Sail, and Navigating with GPS!

In the Spring, we will be offering Power Boating and Depth Sounders. Neither of these courses has yet been offered. The Power Boating course consists of power trains, engine controls and instruments, handling under power, engines, fuels and fuel systems, electrical systems, cooling and lubrication, cruising under power, maintenance and fire safety, marine engines -- trouble diagnosis, cruise, wind, weather and whitecaps, Beaufort wind scale, the weather glass and antennae locations of B.C. and Ontario Radio Stations. The Depth Sounder course consists of Depth Sounders, Interpreting the Display, Controls, Adjustments, Features, Technical Features, Advanced Types of Depth Sounders, Installing a Depth Sounder, Navigating with the Depth Sounder and Troubleshooting.

It seems even more so than in the past environmental issues keep popping up and are becoming more of a concern to us all. It also seems everywhere you look and in almost everything you read there is some mention of the environment. So its up to each of us to do our part in preserving it. In the June issue of Pacific Yachting magazine there was a great article on alternate fuels like hydrogen power or biodiesel which may become a way of the future. There is also a list of available pump-out stations, like our very own Reed Point Marina. We may as well embrace these and get use to using them as they will become a way of the future as well. With more and more no-discharge zones popping up the pump-out stations are the logical choice because even with a macerator it won't help you if you can't discharge it. We all enjoy the private little bays to anchor in on a peaceful summer evening. I can't imagine what that would be like without clean clear water and having pollution surrounding you or floating by you. People I talk to generally seem to be more aware of their own practices and more observant of others who are not pulling their own weight. So lets not pump bilge water overboard!! Try to limit engine oil leaks, take care when refueling not to spill, and by all means dispose of sewage and garbage in a proper manner. Have a great summer and here's a little tip when fueling up → While filling your tank use your hand to check for air escaping from the vent. When the tank is nearly full, you will feel a distinct increase in air flow. That is the signal to 65 filling! ..... see you on the water!
