

Hi! Just an update on the training situation in the Port Moody Squadron. In a word, WOW. As we had said we wanted to run a lot of courses this year and boy are we!

In last Fall's boating course we had 46 people take the exam and when the dust had settled, all 46 passed with a 89 plus% average. mark. We had about 30 of that number join, and of that, about 12 have come in and either proctored or are going to take the next Piloting course. We ran a VHF class and had 19 people take and pass this course. We have also ran the Kids Boat Pro course and all 7 youngsters passed. They also made the front page of the local news paper. Of that number one of these young people has offered to teach in the next one and another has offered to proctor. The preparations for this are in the works. We also ran a Fall Piloting course and 6 people passed. So, to date we have had 78 students take and pass our various courses. Now we have 42 students in the Spring Boating course and all seem to be doing very well at this point. We have approximately 30 people who want to take the VHF course starting on Feb. 5. We have 16 signed up for the Spring Piloting course starting on Feb 26. We have 10 people sighed up for the Advanced Piloting course starting on Feb 18. I have also started to set up an Instructional Tech. Course for young people and hope to get about 10 young people for that. Last, I hope to run one more Kids Boat Pro course later this spring. If all goes well, we have within our grasp, to put over 170 people though our various courses. By the end of this training year we will have ran: * 2 Boating Courses * 2 VHF Course * 2 Piloting Courses * 1 Advanced Piloting Course * 2 Kids Boat Pro Courses * 1 IT Course ... That gives a total of 10 courses this training year!

At this point I wish to point out that takes a real team effort by a lot of very good people to make this happen. It is fun and a very large privilege to work with all of them and I wish to thank everyone who has pitched in to make all this happen. As it has been said "build it and they will come" and boy have they!

MAREP REPORT

This has been one unbelievable winter, with many great days and nights for boating. The long range forecasts indicate that the coming months into Spring will continue this situation. As the nights become a little milder and the temptations become stronger to get out into the backwaters for that overnight anchorage, you might keep in mind a few other things which can occur in the High Pressure conditions which give fine cool nights and bright days:

It may be "high pressure" (over 1013 millibars) here, but it could be much **higher** pressure in the interior of the Province, along with very cold and dry air. At night this can mean strong outflows through the mainland inlets. This wind can flow through the venturi of Howe Sound for example, and reach gale force in the vicinity of Pam Rocks, even though the surrounding area is quite calm. The same situation to a lesser degree holds for Indian Arm – and Bedwell Bay is wide open to this flow. Make sure that your anchorage is sheltered from a north/northeast wind.

With the calm days there are opportunities to pop across a benign Strait of Georgia for a couple of days in the Gulf Islands. Be aware, however, that the noted strong overnight outflow winds of cold and dry air from the mainland inlets can whip across the Strait, pick up moisture from the relatively warm water, be lifted by the Island mountains, and dump a load of late season snow on the east coast of the Island when it is least expected. I'll bet that you do not pack a snow broom on your boat!

However, for those clear, crisp and still nights at anchor you must be prepared for the possibility of radiation fog. It may well be there in the morning – the question during this season will be when will it clear? Summer radiation fog usually dissipates quickly as the heat of the morning sun increases. With generally cool temperatures, a low winter sun which may be shielded by adjacent hills, and with a shallow layer of saturated cool air which has drained down these same hills overnight, it is possible that the temperature may not rise above the sea level dew point. You may be stuck in a layer of fog which may not be much higher than your boat. It is very frustrating to look up to blue sky, but not be able to see more than a few metres horizontally! Often, this stuff is very local – check weather reports and listen out on commercial VHF channels to see what local working traffic is doing. Just remember that they may be working on radar!

In our urban-dominated coastal areas, more than two or three windless and clear days this time of the year usually leads to an inversion, saturation of the cool low level air, and overnight fog. After four or more days there is an increasing likelihood that the fog will not clear at all during the day. Accordingly, don't venture out on your overnight jaunt late in the period of high pressure. You may wake up to a fogged-in anchorage which does not clear until the next front comes through!

Winter boating is neat – just be aware that even consistently fine weather requires a little more planning and awareness than just checking the forecast.
